- I. Mitch and Blanche's date:

 - C. M. asks for a kiss
 - -B. explains that "it's wasn't the kiss I objected to. I liked the kiss very much. It was the other little familiarity--that I--felt obliged to--discourage.... I was somewhat flattered that you--desired me! But, honey, you know as well as I do that a single girl, a girl alone in the world, has got to keep a firm hold on her emotions or she'll be lost!"
